
Meanwhile, Barbara and I have just passed our third anniversary at Parkshore, which hardly seems possible. We love being here and especially value the relationships we've built with many of you.

## Adriana Lecouvreur By: Francesco Cilèa

Ils it possible to convince people to come to an opera they've probably never heard of? My story starts with a 1954 record entitled "Maria Callas, Coloratura, Lyric" in which she sings two beautiful arias (songs) from Adriana Lecouvreur. Callas is probably the leading influential soprano of the Twentieth Century. Her musical and dramatic talents led to her being hailed as La Divina ("The Divine One") to this day.

Flash forward to the recent lockdown which the Metropolitan Opera handled by streaming a new opera free every day from their large supply of Live in HD productions. At Mirabella, I emailed residents with information on each day's opera which we could watch on our computers or other devices.

When Adriana Lecouvreur with Anna Netrebko appeared, I was thrilled! I had seen it "Live on HD" at a theater in Northgate in 2019 and loved it.

Famous Russian soprano Anna Netrebko brings her acclaimed portrayal of the passionate real-life French actress at the heart of Francesco Cilèa's Adriana Lecouvreur, set in 1730s Paris, to the Metropolitan Opera for the first time in a new special 2019 New Year's Eve gala production.

Love, mystery and a potential murder... nothing is certain in Adriana Lecouvreur, inspired by the life and mysterious death of the 18th century French actress.

Sir David McVicar's staging—which recreates an 18th–century French theater in exacting detail—is the work's first new Met production in more than 50 years. Others in the cast include Anita Rachvelishvili, in the role of the Princess of Bouillon, with Piotr Beczała as Maurizio and Ambrogio Maestri as Michonnet, the two men in love with Adriana.

Adriana Lecouvreur is one of the most coveted roles for great dramatic sopranos. Its arias are frequently performed in concerts by sopranos with spectacular voices, including more recently Angela Gheorghiu, Dames Kiri Te Kanawa and Joan Sutherland, Renee Fleming, etc.
